



The Infamous Barbara Palmer

Barbara is a royal villain in several works, such as, George Bernard Shaw's play, Good King Charles's Golden Days, Patricia Campbell Horton's Royal Mistress, etc. Charles II granted William Penn the area of Pennsylvania and granted Fairfax the area south of the Potomac river over to the Shenandoah Valley. His grandfather, James I, granted Palmer Island to Edward Palmer.

Barbara Villiars Palmer was a mistress of Charles II.

Edward Palmer's will mentions John Palmer Esq., late grandfather, and of Mary his wife, sister of William Grivell, one of the Judges of the Common Pleas, and of Sir Giles Grivell, knight. He mentions his "uncle William Palmer, sometime one of the gentleman pensioners to King Henry VII" of Wales who had conquered England in 1488, before Columbus discovered America.


Martin Palmer (1726-1790) had 200 acres in Charlotte Co., VA in 1767 near his sons, Luke and Chillian. Isham Palmer left Lebanon, TN moving to Edward's Deport in Hind's Co., Mississippi. John Cox died there in 1836. Isham's land became a famous Civil War battle scene with 22,000 confederate soldiers.

Barbara, a royal mistress, was portrayed in many plays and films by actresses: 1911 Agnes Keogh, 1922 Elizaberth Beerbohm, 1926 Juliette Compton, 1934 Anne Grey, 1947 Natalie Draper, 1969 Moira Redmond, 1974 Diana Rayworth, 1989 Emma Samms, 1995 Letitia Dean, 2003 Helen McCrory, 2009 Antonia Kinley.


Diana, Princess of Wales and Sir Anthony Eden, British Prime Minister are reported to be Barbara's descendants.

The Crown owned the Colonial world under Charles II, and Dr. Daniel Coxe became the Propietor of West Jersey. As explained HERE, Daniel offered to provide land for the Hugenots west of Richmond, VA but failed. Instead, Robert Bolling, who married Pocahantas, surveyed 10,000 acres for them.

Google has much more on James I, who produced the King James Bible (leaving out the "extra books") and gave Delaware to De La Warr (Thomas West) covered HERE. Charles II made William Penn the Proprietor of Pennsylvania, and Lord Fairfax became the Proprietor of the land south of the Patomac River westword over to the Shanandoah. James Palmer, Knight, was born January 29, 1584 at Wingham, Kent, England and lived at Dorney Manor in Buckinghamshire and died in March, 1657. He married Martha Gerard of Dorney Manor. Secondly, he married the widow of Sir William Herbert, Knight, and had Roger Palmer who married Barbara Villiers.

At his death, his children were ages of about: Philip 42, William 31, Percy 29, James 27, Catherine 25, Roger 23 (married Barbara Villiers Palmer), Frances Mary 21, Anne 19, James 17, & Jane 15.

After many generations, in Charlotte Co., VA, Littleberry Cox's parents bought land from James Palmer, and, eventually, in Lebanon, TN, Littleberry's nephew had two sons, Anderson and John Cox, who married two Palmer sisters, Sally and Elizabeth Palmer.

THE WILL of EDWARD PALMER

of London and late Lemington in the County of Glocester Esq. 22 November 1624, proved 15 December 1624.

To the parish church at Todenham, towards the reparations of the same and of the same and of the chapel belonging to <u>Lemington house</u>, commonly called the Place, in the parish of Todenham, where I was born, forty shillings.

A seemly monument to be erected in the same chapel for the memory of JOHN PALMER, ESQ., ny late grandfather, and of Mary his wife, sister of WILLIAM GRIVELL, one of the Judges of the Common Pleas, and of SIR Giles Grivell, <u>a knight</u>, both long since deceased.

To my daughter Mary a piece of plate of same value. Another to my daughter Charlton and another to my daughter Rutter.

To my son Richard Palmer seven hundred pounds, in my hope my said son will for a good education and maintenance of Bridget, his only child and daughter.

References to the bargain and sale of the <u>manor of OVER LEMINGTON</u>, sold by my father to RICHARD PALMER of Berton, gentleman, my wife's father.

The manor of NETHER LEMINGTON sold by myself to the said RICHARD PALMER.

Certain assurances and releases of the manor of MIDDLE DITCHFORD to Ralph Sheldon ESQ. From my father and others. Certain entrails thereof heretofore made by my grandfather and my uncle WILLIAM PALMER, sometime one of the gentlemen pensioners to King Henry VIII and Edward VI

The manor of CHURCHHILL sold by my father to Sir Christopher Hatton, Knight.

My son GILES PALMER to be sole executor, or if he die, then my son THOMAS PALMER

For supervisors I appoint SIR GILES OVERBURY, Knight, SIR MATTHEW PALMER, <u>Knight</u>, George Lascells, Esc, Laurence Maidewell Esc., Mr. ____Lea, citizen of London and Richard Croftes, gentleman to each of whom a ring of gold of four angels.

And my will and mind is that if I shall happen to give unto my said son of RICHARD the sum of two thousand pounds or more out of my profits of Virginia and New England, then the seven hundred pounds (as foresaid) shall not be charged upon my personal estate &c.


And as touching <u>my castles, manors</u>, <u>lands</u>, <u>tenements and hereditaments which now or hereafter shall be built and erected in Virginia or New England</u> in the parts beyond the seas I give the same to my son Giles &c. with remainder to my son Thomas &c. then to EDWARD PALMER only son of my brother William.

And for default of 11 such issue males & all the aforesaid castles, lands &c. shall be and remain for the founding and maintenance of a University and such schools in Virginia as shall be there erected and shall be called ACADEMIA VIRGINIENSIS ET OXONIENIS and shall be divided into several streets or alleys of twenty foot broad; and all such as can prove their lawful descent from JOHN PALMER ESQ OF <u>Lemington</u> aforesaid, my grandfather deceased, or from my late grandmother, his wife, being sons shall be freely admitted and shall be brought up in such schools as (s)hall be fit for their age and learning and shall be removed from time to time as they shall profit in knowledge and understanding.

And further <u>my will is that the **scholars of the said University**, for avoiding of idleness at their hours of recreation, shall have two painters, the one for oil colours and the other for water colours, which shall be admitted Fellows in the same College.</u>

And further my will and mind is that two grinders, the one for oil colours, the other for water colours, and also colours, oil and gum waters shall be provided from time to time at the costs and charges of the said College,

...beseeching God to add a blessing to all these my intents. Byrde. 114.



Timeline for Palmers in Warwick, Warwickshire, England

914 Saxon Queen Erhelfieda at Warwick, England in Western England, near Wales

1066 William the Conqueror captures England beginning with the Battle of Hastings south of London.

1068 William the Conqueror founded Warwick Castle.

1189 Richard de Lionheart leads the third Christian Crusade. A Palmer Crusader carried a palm tree branch back when he returned from Palestine.

1530 King Henry VIII owned the castle at Warwick and held court there.

Richard Meville, War of Roses.

Francis and Daisey Greville of Warwick. He was Prince of Wales and became Edward VII.

Alcester, the family home of of Henry VIII.

St. Mary's Guildhall, Coventry, Warwickshire. Henry VI.

Mary, Queen of Scotts imprisoned at Guildhall.

1566 Elizabeth I ordered the Mayor to bring Mary Queen of Scotts to Coventry,

1567 Elizabeth I ordered a beheading.

1572 Elizabeth I went through Warwickshire to the home of Thomas Charlecote's home. His widow, Catherine, married George Fitzroy, illegitimate son of Charles II. 1575 Robert Dudley, Earl of Laicester, pursues Elizabeth I at Keniworth Castle in order to marry her but was unsuccessful.

1642-45 Civil War. Coventry refuses sanctuary for Charles I during 1642.

Henry VIII married Jane Seymour (Friends of George IV).

Palmers and now the Leonards and Coxes James Leonard was born in Pontypool, Trevethin Parish, Monmouth County, England in 1620

In 1935, a letter was found saying that Donald Leonard's ancestor, <u>Jacob Leonard, having his own ship</u>, left from England for New York, that his ancestors were French Huguenots who escaped the St. Bartholomew massacre in 1572 (link <u>HERE</u>). They first settled in Margate, England (next to Kent County). Frank Leonard is mentioned.

His father, Thomas, married Lydia White of Pontypool, Wales. He is in a deed in Pontypool, Trevethin, on July 29, 1633. On June 26, 1635, James sailed from Pontypool, Wales, to settled in York County, VA. The family had an iron manufact-uring 1200 years in Germany and England (source HERE) and in Kinver, Staffordshire and Pontypool, England and Bristol Co., Mass. An ironworks was at Jamestown, VA in 1623.

James Leonard was born in Pontypool, Trevethin Parish, Monmouth County, England in 1620.

Barbara Villiers Palmer had six children. The first was Anne Palmer, or Anne Palmer Stewart, or <u>Lady Anne Stuart</u> (since her mother was a Royal Mistress of King Charles Stewart). Anne was born at Westminster on 2/25/1661 and eventually married Thomas Leonard. Anne's children were Charles Leonard, Henry Leonard, Charlotte Leonard, George Leonard and others (More details this Palmer/Leonard line <u>HERE</u>).

Note there are about 16 miles from <u>Pontypool</u> (where the Coxes and Leonards lived) <u>to</u> where the Palmers lived at <u>Lemington</u> house, near St Mary's & St Peter's, Monmouthshire, England, where Edward Palmer left a will on 11/22/1624 at the Parish church at Tidenham. The Palmers can be traced

back to the Dutch Revolution in the Netherlands. James Palmer owned a Manor House in Buckinghamshire called Dorney described <u>HERE</u>.

The Abraham Lincoln - Littleberry Cox Connection

In Charlotte County, Virginia, John Cox, Littleberry's father, bought his property at Hat Creek, Charlotte Co..., VA from a James Palmer.

His-great-grandfather, Mordecai Lincoln, married <u>Hannah Salter</u>, and settled in Monmouth Co., New Jersey as explained <u>HERE</u>. Mordecai was buried at the Yellow Meeting House, and his wife, and his brother, Abraham, were likely in unmarked graves. Hannah's father, John Salter, had an uncle, John Bowne, who left a will in 1714, in Trenton, NJ, which mentions his iron works. Likewise, the Leonard's had an iron works in Trenton. This likely explains the Coxes, Leonard's and Lincoln's living near Yellow Meeting House there. More should be gleaned from Henshaw's Quaker Encyclopedia.

Nancy Hanks (Abraham Lincoln's mother) and her parents lived close Hat Creek Church, Campbell County, VA, near Littleberry Cox's home (as found <u>HERE</u> and page 28 <u>HERE</u>). Littlberry Cox was ten years older than Nancy.

The Presbyterian minister at Hat Creek after 1741 was Gilbert Tennent of New Jersey (Harvard) (HERE). Samuel Davies (November 3, 1723 – February 4, 1761). He held "Great Awakening" revivals (HERE) in Hanover County and resided for awhile at Farmville, VA, next to Charlotte County. Davies became the President of Harvard in New Jersey.



Warwick/Lemington During England's Civil War

After Henry VII of Penbroke, Wales, his son, Henry VIII ruled England and split from the Catholic church and demolished Catholic churches in England after 1536. This included the Cathedral at Glastonbury. His daughter, Elizabeth I followed his beliefs in preserving his separate Church of England.

She died in 1603 without offspring, and the Scotish branch became ruler of Ireland, Scotland and England under James VI of the Scotish branch of Henry VII (James I of England branch of Henry VII).

He removed to England after 1603 anjd preserved the <u>Prince of Wales</u> tradition, but Royal dynasty became in conflict with the Parlaments in Scotland and England, and this grew into a Civil War, which began at Edgehill, 12 miles from Stratford, in 1742. Charles I was captured and beheaded in 1649. Charles II fled to his mother in France until 1660 and began relations with Barbara Palmer whose father had been a Royalist in the war. George Fitzroy, son of Barbara Palmer and Charles II, married Catherine, widow of Thomas Lucy of Warwickshire.

Branches of Henry VII occupied the Warwick Castle in Warwickshire adjacent to Lemington Spa. It had first been built in 1068 by William the conqueror after he invaded England in 1066. Elizabeth I and Queen Victoria visited there. Princess Diana mentions the Victorian Rose Garden in the castle. Charles gave millions of acres to William Penn, Lord Fairfax, Dr. Daniel Cox, Robert West and other Propriators in the New World, and Barbara was his mistress.

John Shakesphere settled his family at Stratford Upon Avon in 1557. William <u>Shakesphere</u> wrote two plays per year.

He had a nephew named William Walker.

Harvey's of Lemington, Glocestershire, England and Hancocks of Charlotte Co., VA

As a reminder, the Palmers came from Lemington, Gloucester, England, and the Palmer's had branches in Charlotte Co., VA living close to the family of Littleberry Cox. The Madison Connection

President James Madison's grandfather, Ambrose, had a brother, Henry Sr. living in King William Co. VA surrounded by members of <u>the Huguenot Church</u> (listed in the *Douglas Register* by Rev. William Douglas).

Henry had six grandkids attending the Rough Creek Church in Charlotte County near the home of Patrick Henry. Henry Madison's grandsons, James and Henry, were Elders at Rough Creek. His granddaughter, Nancy, had married Rev Samuel Armstead, an Executor of John Cox's will in 1821.

Ambrose Madison's brother, Roger, had a daughter, Ann, who married Henry Cox of Charlotte County. Rev. John Weatherford of Rough Creek performed the marriage of Sarah Cox, a sister of Littleberry. Weatherford was arrested for preaching without a license, and he was released by Patrick Henry. This was great story with great results.

Like the Madisons living in King William Co. VA surrounded by members of the Huguenot Church (listed in the *Douglas Register* by Rev. William Douglas), there were other Huguenots of France who migrated from King William County to Charlotte County. Littleberry's brother, Charles Cox, married Emily Noel (Nouwelsz). Her daughter, Lucretia, married Walker Cox of Casey Creek, KY, my great-grandfather's brother. As said, the Palmers had lived there.

Littleberry's will and his father's will were signed by a Sublett previously living in King William County, VA.

As said, In 1935, a letter was found saying that Donald Leonard's ancestor, Jacob Leonard, having his own ship, left from England for New York, that his ancestors were French Huguenots who escaped the St. Bartholomew massacre in 1572 (link <u>HERE</u>). They first settled in Margate, eastern coast of England (next to Kent County). Frank Leonard is mentioned.

Perhaps the connection between surnames, Lennard and Cox, was by an adoption or incest, an unknown male, or consential sex. I know several examples of these, which, on the baptizmal record, the word, "Illegitimate" appears.

At least this explains how a Cox line can be in the J2a instead of in the more common R1b1 haplogroup.

Nevertheless, TABLE 5 is quite self-explanitory. James Palmer and Littleberry Cox differs by only eight markers after 400 years. These markers are: DYS 393, DDYS 388, DYS 439, DYS 464b, DYS 464c, DYS 464d, DYS 456, YS 570, (only one, DYS 537, mismatch in last 30 of the 64 markers).

Thomas Sublett was a witness of the Will of Littleberry's father.



Her great-granddaughter, Syrelda Goode of Casey Creek, Ky, was my great-grandmother. John Fore received land from Captain Nash anddied in Charlotte Co., VA. His daughter, Keziah Fore, married John Mason and bought 126 acres in Charlotte County in 1798. Sally Mason married Charles Ready, and William Mason (Massoneau) married Jenny Ready, sister-in-law of Littleberry Cox. It is suspected that Publius Jones, Sabra Morris, and others mentioned also attended a church in this area of Turnip Creek.



If so, this becomes a source for the "Jew-ish" J2 Y-DNA of the Cox, Cook & Cok family and supports the idea they came to the New World with the Rhys, Rees, Reese families.

Another says Joseph of Arimathea (Ramah) and Christ's mother came to Glastenbury, England, with the cup used during the Last Supper and the Holy Grail (the cup used to collect Christ's blood at the cross)

Allegedly the legendary King Arthur preserved these relics during the late fifth and early sixth centuries (See Geoffrey of Monmouth's Historia Regum Britannie written in 1138. Rootsweb/Family Trees has a John Cox born in Monmouth in about 1408.)

Another version is that Mary Magdalene used a chalice or cup to collect Christ's blood. Allegedly the Grail was transferred to Rome and then to Payne Peveril (Percival) and then to a chapel at Whittington Castle in Shropshire on the border of Wales. Allegedly it was again transferred to Alberbury Priory, and recovered by a descendant, Robert Vernon.

Harveys of Lemington, Glocestershire, England and Hancocks of Charlotte Co., VA

As a reminder, the Palmers came from Lemington, Gloucester, England, and the Palmer's had branches in Charlotte Co., VA living close to the family of Littleberry Cox. Glocester was previously called Warwickshire. Martin Hancock of Red House, Charlotte Co., VA was an executor of the Will of John Cox, Littleberry's father living in Charlotte County. Martin had married Sarah Harvey in Charlotte Co., and her great-great grandfaher, Richard Harvey, was born in 1640 within a few miles from Lemington, Glouchestershire, England.

His father was Sir John Harvey, a Knight living at Warwickshire/Lemington Parish. Warwick/Lemington During England's Civil War After Henry VII of Penbroke, Wales, his son, Henry VIII ruled England and split from the Catholic church and demolished Catholic churches in England after 1536. This included the Cathedral at Glastonbury. His daughter, Elizabeth I followed his beliefs in preserving his separate Church of England. She died in 1603 without offspring, and the Scotish branch became ruler of Ireland, Scotland and England under James VI of the Scotish branch of Henry VII (James I of England branch of Henry VII).

He removed to England after 1603 anjd preserved the Prince of Wales tradition, but Royal dynasty became in conflict with the Parlaments in Scotland and England, and this grew into a Civil War, which began at Edgehill, 12 miles from Stratford, in 1742. Charles I was captured and beheaded in 1649. Charles II fled to his mother in France until 1660 and began relations with Barbara Palmer whose father had been a Royalist in the war. George Fitzroy, son of Barbara Palmer and Charles II, married Catherine, widow of Thomas Lucy of Warwickshire. Branches of Henry VII occupied the Warwick Castle in Warwickshire adjacent to Lemington Spa.

It had first been built in 1068 by William the conqueror after he invaded England in 1066. Elizabeth I and Queen Victoria visited there. Princess Diana mentions the Victorian Rose Garden in the castle. Charles gave millions of acres to William Penn, Lord Fairfax, Dr. Daniel Cox, Robert West and other Propriators in the New World, and Barbara was his mistress. John Shakesphere settled his family at Stratford Upon Avon in 1557. William Shakesphere wrote two plays per year. He had a nephew named William Walker.
